With your help, seniors coping with memory loss have a new way to find relief.

A grant from the Crown Point Community Foundation for \$3,350 helped purchase a Vectra Deluxe Sensory Cart for Wittenberg Village.

Medical professionals who work with residents diagnosed with dementia are often looking for a way to include sensory sessions. The use of multisensory equipment can be an effective way of providing a fun, engaging and non-pharmaceutical way to ease anxieties and resulting behaviors in Wittenberg residents.

The Vectra Deluxe Sensory Cart displays optical illusions of combined lighting effects, aromas, colors, textures and sound to initiate sensory stimulation of residents living with dementia. The purpose is to incorporate both relaxing and activating stimuli to promote the residents' well-being. Studies have shown that a safe, mood-enhancing environment can result in a reduction in medication for some residents and can enhance feelings of comfort and well-being, relieve stress and pain, and maximize a person's

potential to focus, all of which can help improve communication and memory.

"The sensory cart has already proven to be an asset to our daily routine at Wittenberg Village," said Jackie Calarie, Resident Life Director at Wittenberg Village. "The calming effect it has on our residents who may be going through a tough time or are anxious bring moments of relaxation and joy. We are so fortunate to share this with everyone."

In 1989, longtime area physician and community leader Dr. John Birdzell had the idea of establishing a community foundation like the one he had learned about while vacationing in Michigan. He presented the idea to fellow Crown Point Rotary Club members, including Harold Wheeler, Joe Nerney, Tim Sendak, Mike Grant, Larry Rouge, Herman Barber, and his son John Birdzell. Dr. Birdzell's vision was of a foundation that would invest its endowments and use the income to fund grants to the community in perpetuity. The idea was well received, with Harold Wheeler making the first \$1,000 investment.

The following year, the Crown Point Community Foundation was born. Thirty years later, Dr. Birdzell and his fellow founders' vision has resulted in a Foundation with more than 350 funds and \$30 million dollars in managed assets, and an ongoing legacy that has positively impacted countless lives in the South Lake County community.

Since its inception, the CPCF has awarded more than \$14 million in grants to local nonprofits and student scholarships as well as

sponsoring community events including the Volunteer Fair, the Scholarship Awards Night, the Women's Giving Circle, and the Symphony on the Lawn.

A 19 member volunteer Board of Directors as well as a full time staff shepherd the Foundation's role as an proactive member of the community.




